## I. Introduction

A. Purpose

The purpose of this annex is to establish procedures for assisting, protecting and sheltering household pets (cats and dogs) within Guernsey County in the event of an emergency or disaster.

B. Scope

Because of the wide variety of domestic and exotic animals that are maintained as pets, resources do not exist at the county level to provide adequate shelter for each species. Therefore this annex only addresses dogs and cats as household pets.

## II. Situation & Assumptions

- A. Situation
  - 1. Any disaster that threatens humans, threatens animals as well and it will be necessary to provide water, shelter, food and first aid.
  - 2. Animal protection planning will ensure the proper care and recovery of animals impacted during an emergency.
  - 3. Shelter locations may be required to provide domesticated animal control due to sheltered persons bringing their pets with them.
- B. Assumptions
  - 1. An owner is responsible for the care, sheltering, feeding and transportation of their pet.
  - 2. During a large scale emergency a pet owner may become incapacitated, unable to fulfill their responsibility to care for their pet or forced to seek shelter in a Mass Care facility. Mass Care facilities opened within the county during an evacuation or other large-scale emergencies do not permit animals, other than those used for special needs assistance (service animals).
  - 3. Because unattended pets may pose a risk to themselves and to the general public, Guernsey County, during such large scale emergencies, will implement this annex for animal disaster relief.
  - 4. Guernsey County has limited assets to care for animals during a disaster, therefore the assistance of local veterinarians; state agencies, federal agencies and volunteer organizations will be heavily relied upon.

#### **III. CONCEPT OF OPERATIONS**

- A. The sheltering and protection of companion animals is the responsibility of their owners. Animal owners should plan for animal care during a disaster as they prepare their family preparedness plan. Information on planning for disaster animal care will be posted on the Guernsey County EMA web site and available at the Guernsey County Animal Shelter.
- B. The Guernsey County Dog Warden will be the lead agency for situation assessment and determination of resource needs. As needed the county will protect animals affected by any disaster to include rescue, shelter, control, and feeding of animals left homeless, lost, or strayed as a result of the disaster. Local vets and pet shops may be requested to provide assistance in this effort.
- C. Requests for animal protection assistance, additional resource needs and additional veterinary medical professionals will be routed through the Guernsey County Emergency Operations Center.
- D. Shelters that have been established for disaster victims will not accept domestic animals. However, if an evacuee comes to the shelter with their pet(s), efforts will be made to assist in locating the domestic animal(s) away from the general populace and given proper care until other arrangements are made.
- E. Pet owners needing shelter for their animals will be directed to designated veterinary hospitals, kennels, boarding facilities, other private animal care shelters, area pet friendly hotels, or as a last resort to the county emergency animal shelter.

#### IV. DIRECTION AND CONTROL

- A. The Guernsey County Dog Warden will direct and control all activities related to household animal protection and control during a disaster.
- B. Due to personnel shortages it is unlikely that any representative for the primary agency or from the support agencies will remain at the EOC throughout activation. Rather coordination will be conducted via radio, phone and during face-to-face meetings at the EOC or in the field.

#### V. Responsibilities

- 1. Lead Agency
  - a. Maintain resource list of those agencies and organizations that are capable to provide support in implementing this annex.
  - b. Maintain standard operating procedures for the implementation of this annex.
  - c. Assess the situation and make a decision on the number and location of shelters that will be used to house animals. Typical pet facilities include the jurisdiction's animal shelter(s), veterinary hospitals, boarding kennel, and pet stores.
  - d. Coordinate with veterinary and animal organizations to arrange for their support and services to help meet the needs of owners of companion animals.

- e. Coordinate and/or manage public and private sector efforts to meet the animal service needs that arise including:
  - (1) Rescue and capture of household pets (dogs and cats) that have escaped confinement.
  - (2) Evacuation
  - (3) Sheltering
  - (4) Care of injured, sick and stray animals
- f. As appropriate, coordinate search and rescue teams to look for household pets left behind by their owners, stray animals, and others needing transport to a safe location.
- g. Open shelters, register pets and provide food, water and medical care as necessary for the animals in the shelter.
- 2. Support Agencies
  - a. Guernsey County Humane Society

Provide assistance to the Dog Warden in meeting the needs of displaced household pets.

b. Guernsey County Pound Partners

Provide assistance to the Dog Warden in meeting the needs of displaced household pets.
